RULES ~ RHEOLAU

- All exhibits must be grown by the exhibitor upon land in his own occupation and must have been in his possession from 1st July. The Committee reserve the right to inspect any competitor's garden.
- **THE COMMITTEE RESERVE THE RIGHT TO REFUSE ANY ENTRY.**
- The Judges' decision shall be final as to merit, but should a complaint be made, it shall be decided by the Committee, whose decision shall be final. All objections must be made to the Secretary, in writing, before 3.30pm on the day of the Show, accompanied by a deposit of £1, which will be returned if the objection is sustained. The Judges will not be bound to award a prize in any class where they do not consider the exhibits deserving of one.
- All cut flowers shall be in vases. All vases must be supplied by the exhibitor.
- No exhibitor will be allowed to remove any exhibit from the Show before 4.30pm without special permission from the Secretary.
- Exhibitors infringing any of these rules will be disqualified and all show money and entrance fees forfeited.
- The Committee, whilst taking every precaution to prevent any loss or damage to exhibits, do not hold themselves responsible for same.
- The Committee does not accept responsibility for personal injury.

- All exhibits to be staged by 10.00am. Judging will commence at 10.15am on the morning of the Show, at which time the marquee will be closed off to all except the Judges and Stewards.
- In the event of a tie, the Exhibitors gaining the highest number of First Prizes shall receive the Trophy.
- All prize money to be collected on the Show day.
- Points awarded for Trophies Challenge Cups

1st – 5 points;

2nd – 3 points; 3rd – 1 point.

1st – 3 points;

- The Presentation of Awards will take place in the Horticultural Marquee at 4.00pm.
- Children can enter any class, but Classes 119 – 130 are only eligible for Children.
- Entry Fee – 30p per entry. Children's classes - free.

 - Subscribers of £18 shall receive two membership badges and car to show field.
 - Entry to show ground for the general public.

- Peas and beans **must** be displayed with some stalk attached.
- Tomatoes **must** be displayed with calyces.

- Vegetables should be displayed within an area 18” deep x 24” (45cm x 60cm) without bending any part of them. Garnishing with parsley is allowed and a black base cloth is permitted.
- A Tray or Board measuring 18” x 24” (45cm x 60cm) can be used.

 The Top Vase Class is for a vase of mixed flowers containing a total of between five and ten stems, taken from a minimum of two different kinds of plant. Please note that it is two different kinds of plants; two varieties of the same flowers are not two kinds.
 - The display will be judged out of 35 points; 25 points for the colour, form, condition, quality and freshness of the flowers on display, and 10 points for the overall presentation and effect of the plants in the vase.
 - The vase will be viewed from all directions.
 - Judging of the blooms should be to normal Royal Horticultural Society Rules.
 - Plants used in the display must be showing flowers only; no seed heads or berries are allowed.
 - The vase can be any shape or size and made from any material, but must be in proportion to the display.
 - No accessories whatsoever – such as bows, additional foliage will be allowed.
 - Foliage, which is growing naturally from the flowering stem, and still attached to the stem, will be allowed.
 - Packing material – including florists' foam to keep the stems upright and in place is allowed.
 - A vase, by definition, is any vessel that can be used to hold cut flowers and which is taller than it is wide at its widest point.
